You are your child's first teacher!


Family involvement helps children to succeed, both in school and in life. You can help them in the following ways:


- □ Explore and discover new things together;

TALKING TOGETHER!

Developing language through play is a very effective way to develop relationships between parents and children. Here is a list of activities that you can do with your children to develop their language skills.

A few activity ideas using the contents provided in the bag:

- ☐ Count the number of coloured pencils;
- Name the colours using the coloured pencils or colour cards;
- ☐ Explore numbers and letters by asking your child to repeat after you;
- ☐ Spell your child's first name with the magnetic letters and have them spell it out;
- Create a memory game using the cards, scissors and pencils. Take the colour cards, shuffle them and draw a colour and then give the child 30 seconds to find as many objects as possible in the same colour;
- ☐ "The Child from the 4 Directions" memory game.



Other activity ideas:

THE YES OR NO QUESTIONS GAME

	Place an object in a box and position it so that the child cannot see the object in question.		
	The child must ask yes or no questions, such as: - Is it alive? - Is it soft? - Is it food?		
	Of course, you can switch roles!		
TH	THE BATTLE CARD GAME		
	Take a deck of cards and remove the jacks, queens and kings to simplify things for the child.		
	Deal the cards evenly: 20 cards to the parent and 20 to the child.		
	Place the cards in facedown piles so that no one can see the card values.		
	Both players flip the first card simultaneously and the player with the highest value card takes both cards.		
	Repeat until there are no more cards.		
	When the cards have the same value, another card is flipped and the player with the highest value card takes all four cards.		
	The player with the most cards at the end wins the game.		
	To make the game easier, it is also possible to only keep the cards from 1 to 5.	0	



SINGING AND DANCING TOGETHER



Singing and dancing with children helps them to develop their language skills and enhance their memory. It also gives children an opportunity to concentrate while engaging in physical activity and having fun.

Here are some activities that you can do with your child:

- ☐ With musical instruments such as drums or rattles, have fun making different rhythms that your child can imitate;
- Go outside with your child to make them aware of the surrounding sounds while walking in the forest or listening to singing birds or the flowing river;
- ☐ You can ask your child to finish a song using their imagination. You can also ask them to find words that rhyme with the last word of a nursery rhyme;
- ☐ You can make up some gestures associated with a nursery rhyme (guaranteed fun for everyone).

EX PLORING TOGETHER

Looking and listening

Mother Earth is brimming with opportunities to explore. Children love to experience the sights, scents, sounds and textures of the outdoors.


- ☐ Collect and count different things that may be found outside.
- □ Look at different things outside and ask your child what they want to know about them.




READING TOGETHER

- After having read the books together, ask your child which book they liked the most.
- ☐ Which words in the books can you translate into your own language?
- ☐ Using the letters provided, spell out your favourite words from these books.
- As you read together, ask your child what other animals come to mind starting with the same letters as in the books.
- ☐ As you read *Discovering Animals together*, ask your child what sounds each animal makes.

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NO-COOK PLAYDOUGH

- ☐ 1 cup of salt
- ☐ 2 cups of flour
- ☐ 1 cup of water
- ☐ 3 tablespoons of vegetable oil (or glycerin)
- ☐ Food colouring to obtain the desired colour

One after another, mix all the ingredients together in a large bowl.

We encourage you to do this activity with your child to develop fine motor skills.
